Lesson 25: Judith 14:11 - 16:25

The Death of Holofernes is Discovered, The Assyrian Army Flees, Israel Rejoices, The Song of Judith

In our last lesson, Judith was invited to dine with Holofernes. His plan is to seduce her, but he drank more wine that night than he had ever drunk in his life, and he apparently passed out on his bed. Judith took his sword, grabbed his hair and with two strikes severed his head. She then took the canopy from the bed and wrapped his head in it, left the tent to pray as was her usual custom, after handing the head to her maid to carry. The two women then went to pray before leaving for the gates of Bethulia. She told her story to the towns people, showed them the head of the general, and called for Achior to identify it as that of Holofernes. He was so overwhelmed that he fainted. He then converted to the faith of Israel and was circumcised. Achior joined the house of Israel.
